

An introduction to the National Records of Scotland's Archives

What we hold

National Records of Scotland (NRS) holds around 80 km (49.7 miles) of records which are stored in secure and temperature controlled rooms. The records span from the 12th to the 21st centuries, touching on virtually every aspect of Scottish life.

We are responsible for the public and legal records of Scotland but we also have many local and private archives. They relate to a variety of subjects including: the church, law, government and everyday life. We hold and make available one of the most varied archive collections of records in Britain:

- Government records: Records created by the Scottish Government from the 12th century to the present day; records of the Scottish census and post-1855 civil registration system.
- Church records: Records of the Church of Scotland, Free Church and other Protestant churches. Copies of the records of baptisms, marriages and burials for Roman Catholics before 1855.
- Courts of law and legal registers: Records of the Crown Office, Court of Session, High Court of Justiciary, Sheriff Courts, commissary courts, registers of sasines and deeds.
- **Local authorities:** Valuation rolls, records of some burghs, county councils, justices of the peace and other local authorities.
- **Private and corporate bodies:** Family, legal and estate papers; records of businesses, societies and institutions.
- Maps and plans: Topographical maps and plans, architectural and engineering drawings.
- Nationalised industries and transport: Records of the rail and canal systems, coal, gas, electricity, steel and shipbuilding industries.

- Contact the search room staff (<u>Isrhe@scotlandspeople.gov.uk</u> or via the 'contact us' form on ScotlandsPeople) to arrange a visit and order the records you would like to consult. Access is by appointment only and all records must be requested in advance.
- Bring identification (proof of address, photographic ID) and two passport sized colour photographs to obtain a reader's ticket.
- Bring pencils and paper for conducting your research.

Handling archives

Whilst conducting research in the search room, there are a few points to bear in mind when handling archives:

- Please ensure that your hands are clean and dry.
- Use only pencil when taking notes.
- Do not mark the documents in any way.
- Take care opening bundles/documents and handling the items inside.
- Keep the original order of the bundle.
- Use only acid free bookmarks and do not use post-it notes as markers.
- Do not eat or drink near archives.
